Our "chippies" have been hard at work disassembling the big stack of pallets and sorting out into usable timber and rubbish.

Meanwhile plans for different items, mainly chairs and tables, needed to be finalised.

Production began. Wood had to be cut to size and well sanded to reduce the possibility of a splinter in a hand or other sensitive area (ie. when sitting).



The pile of pallet furniture has rapidly grown thanks to a dedicated team effort.

On the 21st September two ladies from the council came to inspect our progress. I think it is only fair to say that they were very



impressed with the items so far made and their quality.

We will also have our marquee there and will be able to conduct a stall.

Penrith City Council to the Rescue

Now that the driveway and front car parking is all nicely sealed. However we are left with half

the area at the back that could not be "hot mix" sealed as any heavy truck turning on it would create problems. The only solution is to concrete the remaining area. While in dry weather it is not such an issue but as soon as it rains it turns into a slushy mess that not only results in mud being trooped into the shed but is also slippery and generally dangerous. After all, us "old fellas" cannot



afford a fall or we could end up in hospital.



President Mike Siegle had an opportunity to address the Council Meeting in August and as a result they have said that the Council will meet the cost. Thank you Penrith Council from all of us "old buggers".

5th September. A contactor has been employed and work has started with the ground preparation and reinforcing positioned. Weather permitting, the concrete

will be laid on Monday 12th September.

My wife and I are wondering if you would be able to assist us in helping the School Children of Yalumcwa Elementary School on Kiriwina Island and the Elementary School on Kitava Island in Papua and New Guinea.

Early this month Gwen and I have returned from a cruise to Papua and New Guinea where we visited Kiriwina Island.

The local people who live on Kiriwina Island are extremely poor and their schools are desperately in need of the most basic stationary items like Black, Blue and especially Red Pens, Pencils, Colour Pencils, Pencil Sharpeners, Erasers, Rulers, Set Squares and other stationary items. Also the other items that the schools desperately need are basic learning to read books in English, Whistles for the teachers, Tennis Balls, Soccer Balls, Footballs and Air Pumps to inflate the Soccer and Footballs for sport.

We are wondering if you would able to help Gwen and I collect some of these stationary items which we can take with us during our next cruise to Papua and New Guinea in November where we will donate them on

behalf of the Nepean Men's Shed to the Yalumcwa Elementary School on Kiriwina Island and the Elementary School on Kitava Island.

Yalumcwa Elementary School is 10 Km in land from where the Cruise Ships anchor and as these Islands Communities do not have electric power, phones or computes I have written to the Yalumcwa Elementary School asking them if they could meet



with us so we donate to them these much need gifts for their school.

The cost of the items that are desperately needed cost less than that of an ice-cream.
